- I. CALL TO ORDER – Chairman St. Vil called the Public Hearing regarding the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget to order at 7:00 p.m. at the Council Chambers, Town Hall Annex Building, 741 Colonel Ledyard Highway, Ledyard, Connecticut.

IV. PRESENTATION OF THE PROPOSED FISCAL YEAR 2026/2027 BUDGET

Town Council Finance Committee Chairman Jessica Buhle welcomed all those who were attending tonight's Public Hearing both in-person and by video conference. She presented the following PowerPoint regarding the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget:





- ### Capital Improvement Plan
- Major Projects & Ongoing Capital Funding – Tax Levy
- Sawmill Dam Remediation - \$25,000
  - MIS Computer & Server Reserve Fund - \$75,000
  - Fire Apparatus Reserve - \$384,305
  - Public Works Equipment Reserve - \$360,500
  - Municipal Building Reserve - \$100,000
  - JWL Classroom Renovations - \$140,000
  - BOE Ongoing Operating Capital - \$156,500
- Total Tax Levy Capital Projects: \$1,690,487

- ### Grants and Other Capital Funding
- COPS Law Enforcement Technology Grant
    - The COPS Law Enforcement Technology Grant was awarded in FY 25/26 to purchase new computer aided dispatch and record management systems for LPD. Original funding requests were \$180,000 through tax levy. This grant is entirely funded with no match from tax levy.
    - In FY26/27, Council worked with Chief Rich and Capt. Creutz to apply for the COPS Law Enforcement Technology Grant again for in-car video cameras and body cameras. In realistic anticipation, capital funding was reduced by \$20,000 for FY 26/27.
  - Land Use Property Sale Proceeds
    - A blighted property was recently sold; after legal fees to reimburse the Legal line for Land Use, \$73,000 was able to be allocated towards Land Use P&Z Document Updates instead of \$75,000 from tax levy.
  - Whitford Brook Watershed
    - Grant awarded for \$2,800,000 toward replacement of the Lantern Hill Rd bridge over Whitford Brook. This grant is estimated to be 50% of the costs of replacing the bridge; a LOTCIP grant has been applied for as well for the other 50% of the cost.

- ### Additional Considerations
- Motor Vehicle Mill Rate Maximum
    - This year, the mill rate will be below the maximum mill rate. In FY 27/28, we will not receive any reimbursement from the state. In FY 26/27, we are projected to receive ~\$741,000
  - Mashantucket Pequot/Mohegan Fund Revenue
    - FY 26/27 has an increase of \$800,000 from the efforts of Sen. Osten. Current legislation is proposing significant increases to all allocations from the Fund.
  - Veterans Exemptions
    - PA 24-46 provides an exemption for veterans with a service-connected permanent and total disability rating. As a town with a rich military history and population, this Act exempts over \$26m of dwellings and motor vehicles. Proposed HB 5407 would provide reimbursement from the State to cover lost revenue.

- General Government Budget \$31,698,171 for a 6% increase (which included Healthcare costs for both the Town and Board of Education)
- Board of Education Budget \$41,857,335 for a 3.4 % increase
- Projected Mill Rate 26.55

### Driving the 2026–2027 Budget: Contracts & Inflation

The 2026–2027 Ledyard Board of Education budget is primarily focused on maintaining required services while addressing unavoidable external financial pressures, with nearly the entire proposed increase tied to existing legal contracts and the rising cost of goods and services.

**THE DRIVERS OF GROWTH**

- 77.3%** Attributable to Contracts (Largest portion of the budget increase is mandated by existing collective bargaining agreements.)
- 22.2%** Driven by Inflation (Rising costs for utilities, supplies, and external services represent nearly a quarter of the increase.)

**KEY FINDING: Strategic Neutrality**  
Targeted strategic investments (20.7%) are almost entirely offset by line-item reductions (20.2%).

**INFLATIONARY PRESSURE POINTS**

- Rising Special Education Costs** (\$210,703): A limited pool of external providers continues to drive up tuition and service costs.
- Transportation Adjustment** (\$115,678): Reflects the specific inflationary increase for daily bus services and student conveyance.
- Misc. Supplies Inflation** (\$5,278): (Districtwide Nursing, Art, Textbooks)
- Utilities Inflation Adjustment** (\$27,339): (Maintenance: Electricity, Sewer, Water)

### Ledyard Public Schools: 2026-2027 Budget Balancing Act

The proposed \$41.9M budget represents a 3.63% increase, strategically aligning resources to fund new investments (\$304,487) with targeted reductions (\$297,123) to maintain fiscal stewardship.

**INVESTMENTS vs. REDUCTIONS**

Targeted Strategic Investments: **\$304,487** (20.7%)

Line-Item Reductions: **\$297,123**

**Strategic Investments (Program Enhancements)**

- Strengthening Academic & Operational Support: Funding a 1.0 FTE Math Instructional Coach and 1.0 FTE Facilities Department support.
- \$40,802 for Operational Efficiency: Investment in a new districtwide timekeeping system to improve administrative reliability.
- Modernizing Classroom Tools: Allocation for 100 graphing calculators and updated math and science textbooks.

**Targeted Reductions (Cost Savings)**

- \$297,123 in Line-Item Offsets: Reductions made to equipment, software, and tuition to fund new priorities.
- Streamlining Technology & Curriculum: Discontinuing Dreambox software and replacing iReady with STARS assessment to save costs.
- \$62,473 Savings in Tuition: Significant reduction in Magnet School Tuition costs based on current enrollment trends.

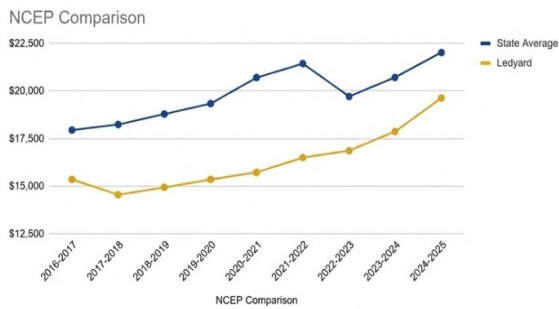

## Per Pupil Expenditure: New London County

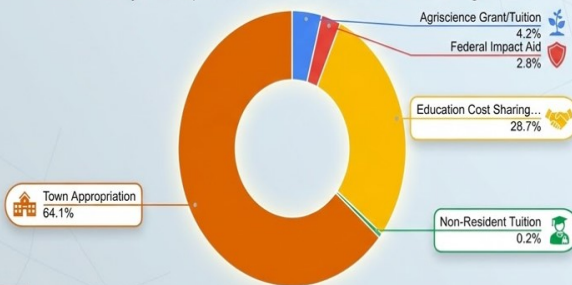
Areas Towns in NL County 2024-2025 NCEP

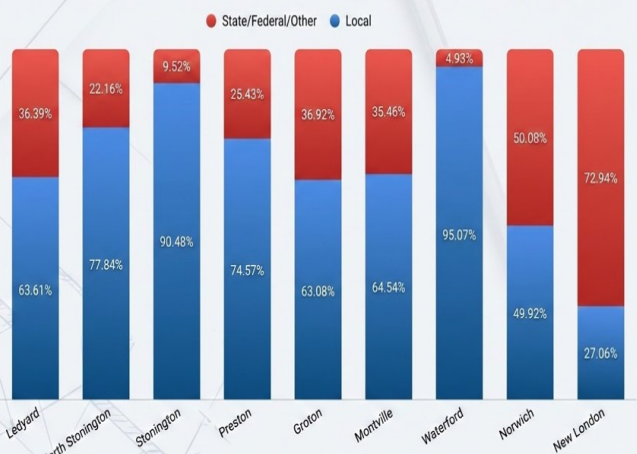
## Funding Sources

Town of Ledyard Proposed 2026-27 Estimated BOE Funding Source

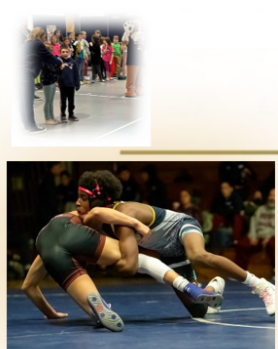

## Questions & Discussion



Chairman St. Vil thanked Councilor Buhle and Superintendent Hartling for their presentations.

VI. PUBLIC COMMENTS (Please limit to 3 minutes)

Chairman St. Vil opened the floor for Residents comments; and he asked that they keep their comments to three minutes or less. He asked those attending on-line to please put their name and address in the Chat and they would be called on in the order they were signed up.

**Mr. Jeff Eilenberger**, 2 Village Drive, Ledyard, commented on the recording of Board of Education expenses on the General Government side of the Budget ledger, noting that this began in 2001 because there were some bookkeeping discrepancies on the Board of Education's side of the budget ledger. He stated that this was not the fault of any of the current Central Office Staff, stating that they were not here in 2001.

Mr. Eilenberger continued by reading excerpts from the Finance Committee April 7, 2025 meeting; which was about one year ago, as follows:

***“Board of Education Healthcare Expenses - Councilor Ryan stated that he agreed with Mayor Allyn’s proposal to move the Board of Education Employees Healthcare Expenses to the Education side of the budget ledger for the following reasons:***

- (1) The Board of Education’s Employees Healthcare Expenses were part of the School District’s operational costs.*
- (2) Transparency - Councilor Ryan stated for accurate accounting of operational costs and for transparency Board of Education expenses should reside on the education side of the budget ledger.*
- (3) Accountability - Councilor Ryan noted that the Board of Education should have oversight of their operational expenses.*

*Councilor Saccone stated although he 100% agreed that the Board of Education Employees Healthcare Expenses and the School Nurses Expenses should be recorded on the education side of the budget ledger, that he did not agree with making the move in the upcoming Fiscal Year 2025/2026 Budget. He explained that because the School Nurses Contract was scheduled to end next year (fy 26/27) that he would suggest they wait to the following year to move these expenses to the education side of the budget ledger. He stated this would give the Board of Education and School Superintendent Hartling 18 months to evaluate their needs, so they could plan accordingly and for the Town Council and Board of Education to work together and plan for the accounting change.*

*Finance Director Matthew Bonin explained other than moving where the Board of Education Employees Healthcare dollars were recorded in the budget ledger, that there would not be any other changes. He stated that the Board of Education was already handling the health insurance for their employees. He stated that the General Government just pays the invoices. He went on to explain that the Town uses a Healthcare Consultant, who was not tied to the Healthcare provider; and that the Healthcare Consultant was paid from the Plan.”*

Mr. Eilenberger stated that Finance Director Matthew Bonin was a Certified Public Account (CPA); and that he trusted what Mr. Bonin said. Mr. Eilenberger commented that a CPA, although not officially, was like a master’s degree 2.0.

Mr. Eilenberger continued to read excerpts from the Finance Committee’s April 7, 2025 Minutes as follows:

*“Councilor Saccone noted that based on Mr. Bonin’s explanation of how the Healthcare was currently being handled by both the Board of Education existing staff and the General Government’s staff, that he did not understand School Superintendent Mr. Hartling comments that moving the expenses and funds to the*

*education side of the budget ledger would incur additional costs for the Board of Education.*

*Mr. Hartling stated by moving the Board of Education's Employees Healthcare Expenses to the Education side of the ledger that they could anticipate an increased cost of about \$100,000 to take on the fiduciary responsibility of the managing a \$6 million program, because they do not have a staffing model to handle the work that has been being managed by the General Government Staff for 24 years.*

*Mr. Hartling went on to state that the Board of Education would have to hire Healthcare Consultants to adequately examine the Healthcare Plan to ensure that they were acting in the most responsible way for both their employees and the Town of Ledyard. He stated that there would also be the legal fees to renegotiate with their labor contracts; and that it would require the addition of one Full-Time Staff person in the Central Office. He noted that the Brown & Brown Employee Benefits Consulting Team was a commission based Consultant".*

Mr. Eilenberger stated from last year's discussion, in which Councilor Saccone stated if they began work at that time, they would have eighteen months to figure things out. Mr. Eilenberger stated they now had about six- months left; and he questioned how they were doing. He went on to state that he worked for the Department of Corrections for 20-years; and therefore, he got pretty good at reading people; and at being able to understand when he was being threatened. He noted during that April 7, 2025 meeting the minutes reflected that Superintendent Hartling said the following:

*"Mr. Harting continued by stating that he would have to have a conversation with the Mayor about what would happen for the General Government Employees Healthcare, noting that there would be no obligation for the Board of Education to include the General Government Employees".*

Mr. Eilenberger stated that he could read between the lines, and hopefully the Town Council could to. He stated that this was the kind of School Superintendent they were dealing with.

Chairman St. Vil stated that he enjoyed having a dialogue and a conversation, and as a resident he cared about Mr. Eilenberger's opinion. He questioned whether there was an action that Mr. Eilenberger would like the Town Council to consider. He stated that Mr. Eilenberger described something that happened in previous years, and therefore, he asked whether there was something that the Town Council should consider, or take under advisement, noting that he was trying to figure out his point.

Mr. Eilenberger stated that the discussion he read were meeting minutes from eighteen months ago; noting that he was explaining how the conversation went when everybody was in the same room; noting there was no objection. He stated it was an 18-month deal and that somebody should have kept up with it.

Chairman St. Vil stated that he sat-in on the Budget Work Sessions this year, noting that where the healthcare expenses were going to reside came up as a point of discussion. He stated that input was provided not only by the Town Councilors, but that Mayor Allyn, III, and Superintendent Hartling provided input as well. He stated it was determined that the healthcare expenses would be something to revisit at a future date, because there was no known savings identified by anyone during that discussion. Therefore, he stated he was trying to figure out whether Mr. Eilenberger knew something that the Mayor does not know; that Superintendent Hartling does not know; and that the Town Council does not know, questioning whether there was a known savings by moving the budgetary line item.

Mr. Eilenberger stated after almost 25- years that he thought the Board of Education had the right staff to take the healthcare over themselves. He stated that it was more efficient, it was more transparent; they would be more accountable; and that was where the healthcare and school nurses expenses belonged.

Chairman St. Vil stated that he holds Mayor Allyn, and Superintendent Hartling in high regard, noting throughout the budget process they have conducted themselves with nothing but total and complete integrity. He stated that he wanted to help Mr. Eilenberger and he

wanted to get involved, however, he stated that he did not understand his statements; and what he was requesting. Therefore, he stated he did not know how to get involved to help.

Board of Education Chairman Jennifer Reguin, attending remotely via Zoom, stated she wanted to provide clarification for the public record. She stated the Superintendent's performance is evaluated by the Board of Education through a formal process, not at this hearing. She stated the Board of Education takes community feedback seriously, and they would address it through the appropriate channels.

Chairman St. Vil thanked the residents for their comments.

## VII. ADJOURNMENT

Chairman St. Vil stated before they adjourn, the he would like to review of the Budget Process from this point forward:

- Tomorrow the Finance Committee (if needed) and Town Council will consider the comments received this evening to determine whether additional budget adjustments were warranted.
- April 22, 2026 the Town Council would vote to Finalize a Proposed Budget to present at the Annual Town Meeting and Referendum.
- **May 18, 2026** the Annual Town Meeting will be held at 7:00 p.m. to present the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 to Residents, at which time they would have an opportunity to provide additional comments.
- **May 19, 2026 Budget Referendum** that will be held on the Voting Machines from 6:00 am – 8:00 p.m. The Voting Location for everyone would be in the Registrar's Office in the Town Hall Lower Level.

### **Should the Budget Fail at the May 19, 2026 Referendum:**

- The Town Council would review the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 to determine whether adjustments were warranted; and forward the Revised Budget to a Second Referendum on the Voting Machines on **Tuesday, June 9, 2026 from 12:00 Noon to 8:00 p.m.** in accordance with Chapter VII, Section 6, of the Town Charter.
- Should the Second Referendum not approve a budget; the Town Council shall adopt a final Budget by the fourth Monday in June (June 22, 2026), in accordance with Chapter VII, Section 6, of the Town Charter.

Chairman St. Vil asked those present to please provide this information to their Friends and Neighbors.

Chairman St. Vil stated hearing no further comments this Public Hearing is Adjourned at 7:36 p.m.

- I. CALL TO ORDER – Chairman St. Vil called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. at the Council Chambers, Town Hall Annex Building.

Chairman St. Vil welcomed all to the Hybrid Meeting. He stated for the members of the Town Council and the Public who were participating via video conference that the remote meeting information was available on the Agenda that was posted on the Town’s Website – Granicus-Legistar Meeting Portal.

- V. RESIDENTS & PROPERTY OWNERS (COMMENTS LIMITED TO THREE (3) MINUTES )

Mr. Jeff Eilenberger, 2 Village Drive, Ledyard, noted that he was present this evening to clarify his comments regarding the Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget that he provided at the April 21, 2026 Public Hearing. He stated in response to Chairman St. Vil’s question in which he asked what action he wanted the Town Council to do for him. Mr. Eilenberger stated that he was asking for the Town Council to transfer the Board of Education’s healthcare expenses to the Board of Education’s side of the budget.

Chairman St. Vil thanked the Mr. Eilenberger for their comments.

- VI. COMMITTEE COMMISSION AND BOARD REPORTS – None.

- VII. COMMENTS OF TOWN COUNCILORS

Councilor Buhle, attending remotely via Zoom, commented on the following: (1) April is the Month of the Military Child – Councilor Buhle stated she was thankful for the all the military kids in their community who were going through their own struggles of military life; (2) Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget Preparation Process – Councilor Buhle thanked everyone who provided input throughout the budget process. She noted the Town Council had an informative Public Hearing on April 21, 2026; and that she looked forward to the rest of the annual budget season.

Councilor Lamb, attending remotely via Zoom, commented on the following: (1) Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget – Councilor Lamb stated he looked forward the remaining budget season, noting that they still had some work to do; (2) Develop an end-to-end process for Capital

Projects – Councilor Lamb stated later this evening the Town Council be appointing members to the new “*Ad Hoc Committee to Develop a Process for Capital Improvement Building Projects*”; (3) Develop a strategic capital improvement plan; and (4) Ledyard’s Preparations for America’s 250 Celebration this summer. Councilor Lamb stated that he looked forward to getting back to Ledyard on May 9, 2026 and continuing to work on all of these initiatives.

Councilor Brunelle commented on the following: (1) National Association of Realtors (NAR) Conference – Councilor Brunelle stated today she attended the NAR Conference regarding Fair Housing, noting that it was interesting, and that it was a good refresher; (2) Communication – Councilor Brunelle stated communication was a lot more than words, noting that it was also about body language, and tone. She suggested the Town Council keep this in-mind when they were communicating with one another, because it was a lot more than the words they say.

Councilor Thompson stated at the Town Council’s April 8, 2026 meeting he announced that the New London Hospitality was hosting their 19<sup>th</sup> *Walk to End Homelessness* on Sunday, April 26, 2026. He stated those interested in participating in this very good cause could still sign-up, noting the Registration Deadline was Saturday, April 25, 2026. He urged those interested in participating in the *Walk to End Homelessness* to visit their website at: [www.NLHC.org](http://www.NLHC.org)

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry noted the following: (1) Administrative Professionals Week – Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated this week was Administrative Professionals Week and she thanked Administrative Assistant Roxanne Mahe for everything she does for the Town Council. She presented Ms. Maher with flowers and card from the Town Council. Ms. Maher thanked the Town Councilor for the beautiful flowers and card, noting that she appreciated their recognition and thoughtfulness; (2) Proposed Ethics Ordinance – March 25, 2026 Public Hearing – Councilor Garcia-Irizarry thanked everyone who attended the third Public Hearing that was held on March 25, 2026 regarding the proposed Ethics Ordinance; as well as all those who attended the Town Council’s April 8, 2026 meeting and provided feedback. She stated the proposed Ethics Ordinance has been referred back to the Administration Committee, noting that she along with Councilor Brunelle and Councilor Barnes would address the feedback that was provided, stating that they would not require a lot of changes to the proposed Ordinance. She stated while they discussed the comments that were provided by email, that some members of the Town Council did not receive Councilor Ryan’s April 8, 2026 email prior to the Town Council’s meeting that evening. She stated only Councilor Barnes, Councilor Lamb, Chairman St. Vil, Administrative Assistant Roxanne Maher, and Mayor Allyn, had received Councilor Ryan’s email earlier that day. She stated had Councilor Lamb not mentioned Councilor Ryan’s email that the rest of the Town Council would not have known about it, and they would not have been able to address Councilor Ryan’s concerns regarding the proposed Ethics Ordinance. She asked in the future, when a Councilor had comments regarding an ordinance, or the budget, or something else, that they make sure all members of the Town Council receive their comments, so that the Councilor and/or the Committee that was working on the particular item could answer the questions. She stated if they send their email to Town Council Office that they ask Administrative Assistant Roxanne Maher to forward their email to everyone on the Town Council. She stated in discussing Councilor Ryan’s comments regarding the proposed Ethics Ordinance that they also learned that he had posted his comments on Facebook. She stated it was frustrating to find all this out in the middle of their discussion during the Town Council meeting, noting that Councilor Ryan’s April 8, 2026 email was not included in the public record of the Agenda.

Councilor Ryan stated during the last three terms that he served on the Town Council that anytime he was not going to be in attendance at a Town Council and he submitted comments to be read; noting that he has always sent them to the Chairman of the Committee meeting that he was not going to be in attendance, whether it was a Finance Committee meeting; or a Town Council meeting. He stated the only time he has sent his comments to the entire Town Council group was when he was submitting general comments that were meant for inclusion as communications. He stated his comments were written to be read at the April 8, 2026 Town Council meeting, noting had he been able to attend the meeting, the Town Council would have heard his comments during the meeting. He stated with his work schedule and other demands that he literally wrote his comments regarding the proposed Ethics Ordinance that same day. He stated going forward that he was happy to send his comments to the Town Council group, noting that had not been his practice during the past five-years. Councilor

Garcia-Irizarry stated that Councilor Ryan's agreement to send his comments to the Town Council group going forward would be appreciated. She stated the problem was that some members of the Town Council had the opportunity to read Councilor Ryan's comments, however, some did not have that same opportunity. She also expressed concern that Councilor Ryan's comments had already been posted on Facebook. Councilor Ryan noting that he posted his comments to Facebook after he sent his email. However, he stated that he understood Councilor Garcia-Irizarry's concerns and that he would be happy to send his comments to the Town Council group going forward.

Councilor Parad commented on the following: (1) April designated as Military Child Month – Councilor Parad stated after Councilor Buhle suggested they wear the color purple in recognition of the Military Child that she looked through her closet and could only come up with one lilac colored article of clothing, which she was wearing this evening. However, she stated that she supported the Military kids noting that she had three Military kids that were born at three different Military Duty Stations; (2) Civics Day Field Trip – Councilor Parad noted that her oldest child with her tenth grade civics class went to Hartford today; noting that they were able to see the Connecticut's Supreme Court in-action. She also noted that some students had the opportunity to see some legislative items in action as well. She noted it was a wonderful experience for the kids; (3) Councilor Parad wished everyone a Happy Earth Day!

Councilor Ryan commented on Ledyard High School's Production of Chicago that was held on March 26, 27, 28, 2026 Thursday, Friday and Saturday – Councilor Ryan stated because he was not able to attend the Town Council's April 8, 2026 meeting that he wanted to acknowledge the amazing job the High School students did in putting on the musical. He stated he brought his kids to see the production, noting that he enjoyed the show better than the Broadway show. He also noted a few years ago the High School put on the Production of Clue, noting the quality, caliber and dedication of their students were on display. He stated for those who have not had the opportunity to see a Ledyard High School Musical to make plans to attend next year's show because they do an amazing job.

Chairman St. Vil addressed the following: (1) April being the month of the Military Child – Chairman St. Vil this is a time to recognize the resilience, strength, and sacrifice of children and military families. These were kids who move frequently, adapt to new schools and communities, and often have parents deployed for long periods of time, all while carrying themselves with the level of maturity well beyond their years. The color purple represented unity and support for military children across all branches of the service. Chairman St. Vil expressed the Town Council's appreciation for the families in their community who serve, and especially the children who support that service every day; (2) Administrative Professionals Week – Chairman St. Vil noted as Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated today is Administrative Professionals Day. This is a day set aside to recognize the people who keep their organizations running, often behind the scenes, but absolutely essential to everything they do. He stated for the Town Council that starts with their Administrative Assistant Roxanne Maher. He noted that Ms. Maher keeps the Council organized, prepared, and moving forward with agendas, meeting minutes, correspondence, coordination, and historical recall, noting that she knows it all. He stated the amount of work that goes into keeping the Town Council functioning as a legislative body was significant, and Ms. Maher does it consistently and professionally. He went on to note that for Ledyard it was not only Ms. Maher, stating that it was all of their administrative professionals across Town Hall. He stated as Mayor Allyn also knows and throughout their community, tier Administrative Professions make sure things run smoothly every single day. These roles have evolved over time, but the importance hasn't changed. In many ways, it's grown. They are the backbones of day-to-day operations, and their work often goes unnoticed, but it should never go unappreciated. Chairman St. Vil stated on behalf of all of the Counselors that he wanted to say, *“Thank you, Roxanne, and to all the Administrative Professionals for the work you do to support this organization and this community”*.

X. FISCAL YEAR 2026/2027 BUDGET UPDATE

Chairman St. Vil stated last night the Town Council held a Public Hearing to present a proposed Preliminary Budget to obtain their residents comments, recommendation, and feedback. He stated other than their Elected Officials only about 10 members of the public attended, noting there was 6 in-person and about 4 attend via Zoom.

Chairman St. Vil went on to note no residents spoke either in-favor or against the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget. He stated later this evening the Town Council would act to move a proposed Budget to the May 18, 2026 Annual Town Meeting; that will Adjourn to a Vote on the Voting Machines on Tuesday, May 19, 2026.

Chairman St. Vil asked Councilor Buhle whether she would you like to add any comments regarding the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027; or prefer to wait until the Town Council addresses it later tonight. Councilor Buhle, attending remotely via Zoom, stated that she would provide comments later this evening when they discuss the budget.

X. COUNCIL SUB COMMITTEE, LIAISON REPORTS

Administration Committee

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated the Administration Committee has a number of items on tonight’s that she would address later this evening.

Community Relations Committee for Diversity Equity & Inclusion

Councilor Brunelle stated although the Committee has not met since the last Town Council meeting; they were working on many exciting things.

Finance Committee

Councilor Buhle stated the Finance Committee would present a proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget later this evening.

Land Use/Planning/Public Works Committee

Councilor Thompson stated although the LUPPW Committee has not met since the last Town Council meeting they have two items on tonight’s agenda.

**Liaison Reports**

Inland Wetland and Water Courses Commission

Councilor Thompson stated the IWWC would be conducting two site walks on Friday, April 24, 2026 at the following locations: Silas Dean Road; and Center Groton Road.

Library Commission

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated the Library Commission met on Monday, April 20, 2026 and discussed the following: (1) Friends of the Library Pie Sale raised \$900.00 to help the Library; (2) Seed Library Opened on March 18, 2026 and they have given out over 600 packages of seeds to residents; (3) Passport to Connecticut Libraries Program – Councilor Garcia noted about 171 libraries throughout the were State participating in the Program. She explained that library patrons would receive a Passport that they could have stamped when they visit other participating libraries in the state; (3) Youth Audio Books Circulation – Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated since the Library introduced Yoto Audio Books that the circulation has increased tremendously, noting in December, 2025 they had 8 circulations; and in March 2026 they 229 Youth Audio Books in circulation; (4) Homebound Patrons – Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated Library Director Jessica Franco, and her Staff were working to revitalize a Program to Deliver Books to Homebound Patrons. She noted that the Library Commission approved the Form that the volunteers would be required to fill out to participate in the delivery of the books to homebound patrons; (5) Library Director Jessica Franco is on

Maternity Leave, and her staff was doing a great job in keeping the Library operations running smoothly.

#### Parks, Recreation & Senior Citizens Commission

Councilor Parad noted the Commission postponed their April 21, 2026 meeting due to the passing of a Commission member.

#### Ledyard Historic District Commission

Councilor Lamb stated the Commission met on April 20, 2026 and addressed the following: (1) Spicer Homestead Ruins Historic Preservation Presentation – Councilor Lamb stated the Commission was continuing their work and hoped to provide a preliminary report to the Town Council in June, 2026; (2) Gales Ferry Historic District Application – Councilor Lamb noted the commission approved to submit an Application to the Planning & Zoning Commission for a Gales Ferry Historic District; (3) America 250 Planning Committee – Councilor Lamb noted that the Commission would be supporting some portions of the America 250 Celebration.

#### Agricultural Commission

Councilor Lamb stated the Agricultural Commission met on April 21, 2026 and discussed working together with the Farmers Market Committee, Conservation Commission and students on some initiatives.

#### Conservation Commission

Councilor Lamb noted that the meeting portal had two meetings listed for the Conservation Commission in May. Therefore, he stated that he check to see if the Commission was planning to meet twice in May.

#### Board of Education

Councilor Barnes noted Ledyard High School Principal Amanda Fagin’s Invitation to attend the Graduation on June 18, 2026. He stated last year he attended the graduation; and that he planned to attend this year as well. He encouraged members of the Town Council to attend the graduation if their schedules permitted, noting that they should contact Jennifer Hepburn via email at [jhepburn@ledyard.net](mailto:jhepburn@ledyard.net) if they planned to attend. He stated the line-up was at 3:30 p.m.

#### Ledyard Center Fire Company

Councilor Barnes stated the Ledyard Center Fire Company’s 75<sup>th</sup> Annual Awards Banquet was scheduled for Saturday, May 16, 2026 and that members of the Town Council were invited to attend. He stated those planning to attend should contact Skylar Johnson.

Councilor Barnes left the meeting at 7:30 p.m.

### XI. MAYOR’S REPORT

Mayor Allyn, III reported on the following: (1) Connecticut Conference of Municipalities (CCM) Legislative Committee April 16, 2026 meeting – Mayor Allyn noted the following Bills that were still alive: (a) SB #388 “*Restore Pequot Funding back to the pre 2019 Level*” – Mayor Allyn explained if approved, it would add back \$100 million to be distributed to Connecticut’s cities and towns. He stated in 2019 the State Legislature cut the level of funding, and that State Senator Cathy Osten was pushing to restore the Pequot Fund, noting that SB#388 appears to have support; (b) HB #5289 “*Publication of Legal Notices*” – Mayor stated this Bill would allow Municipalities to not have to publish their legal notices in the newspaper. He stated they could publish their legal notices on the town’s website and maintain a paper copy in print for one-year. He stated this would save Municipalities thousands of dollars; (c) HB #5002 “*Education Cost Funding (ECS)*” – Mayor Allyn stated the state was looking to increase the ECS Funding to \$16,000 per pupil; and then track the inflation rate; (d) SB #151 “*Limits Local Zoning Authority for Lot Sizes, Setbacks*” – Mayor Allyn stated this Bill would allow setbacks to be reduced to 5-feet on either side yard and 10-feet for front and rear yards if they have public water and public sewer, the dimensional requirements are reduced, and lot coverage was no longer an issue. In addition it allowed one single family building lot to be split into three lots without question; (e) HB #5396 “*Affordable Housing on Lands Owned by Religious Organizations*”- Mayor Allyn stated this

Bill would allow religious organizations to build on the property; and they would not have to go the Planning & Zoning for any approvals. All that would be required was a *Summary Review*; (f) SB #447 “\$50,000 Automatic Assessment Exemption for Every Owner-Occupied Single-family and Condominium in Every Town throughout the State of Connecticut” - Mayor Allyn stated based on Ledyard’s current mill rate that the property taxes would be reduced by about \$1,327,50 per account; requiring a 4 mill tax increase for everybody else; (g) HB #5407 “An Act Concerning State Reimbursement to Municipalities for Revenue Lost Due to the Property Tax Exemption for Veterans with a One Hundred Percent Permanent and Total Disability Rating” – Mayor Allyn stated that he was hearing from some Legislators that this Bill was not getting the traction required to pass. He stated the Southeastern Connecticut Council of Government (SECOG) Leaders would be meeting at the State Capitol on Monday, April 27, 2026 with their Regional Delegation with the hope to apply some pressure, noting that every town in Southeastern Connecticut was hit hard by Public Ac 24-46 “Providing a 100% Tax Exemption for 100% Permanently and Totally Disabled Veterans”; (2) Department of Housing and Habitat for Humanity April 16, 2026 Meeting – Mayor Allyn stated the Habitat for Humanity Project located at the end of Colby Drive was looking at a six-month delay. He explained because they were scheduled to receive federal and state funds they were required to notice various parties of what they intend to do in terms of excavation; and whether there was anything of historic significance at the location where they would be building homes. He noted that the Colby Drive would extend off Fairway Drive and come out to Colonel Ledyard Highway next to the Salty Hefer Restaurant; (3) America 250 Planning Committee April 14, 2026 meeting – Mayor Allyn stated Parks & Recreation Director Scott Johnson, Jr., would be conducting a Red, White, & Blue Color Run on the day of the Memorial Day Parade. He stated Run would begin around 8:00 a.m. and should be completed by 10:00 a.m. which should be well before the Parade assembles at 12 Noon. The Memorial Day Parade would have a Colonel Float, America Themed Candy, Roaming Poster Display of Historic Town of Ledyard Figures. He also noted that a Time Capsule would be buried, and there would be other activities that would take place at the Historic Nathan Lester House on July 4, 2026 from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. Mayor Allyn stated that more information would be coming; (4) Public Law 25-01 “Housing Law” - Regional Housing Plan Meeting April 16, 2026 – Mayor Allyn stated Southeastern Connecticut Council of Governments (SECOG) held the meeting here in the Council Chambers, regarding Public Law 25-01 “Housing Law” explaining that this new law would determine how many units of Affordable Housing each Town was supposed to allocate. He stated members from the Planning & Zoning Commission, Inland Wetlands and Water Courses Commission, Economic Development Commission, as well as members from the North Stonington were in attendance to hear about the Housing Law and how it could move forward; (5) Gales Ferry School Roof Meeting – April 16, 2026 – Mayor Allyn stated he attended a meeting with the Bonding Company regarding the long standing battle concerning the completion of the Roof and the Photovoltaic System that was supposed to part of the project. He stated the solar array that was supposed to be installed on the Gales Ferry School Roof was expected to save the Board of Education about \$6,000 per month. However, he stated they have yet to see those savings, noting that it was costing a lot of money, as they wait for the roof project issues to be resolved. He stated the meeting with the Bond Company’s Representatives went well; and that he would keep the Town Council apprised on the status of the matter; (6) Roadside Clean-up April 18, 2026 – Mayor Allyn stated he participated in the Ledyard Rotary Club Roadside Clean-up. He stated in past years the Rotary Club cleaned-up Route 12 in Gales Ferry. However, he stated because the Department of Transportation (DOT) felt the Route 12 too dangerous for people in bright yellow vests to be picking-up trash along that road on the weekend, that this year the Rotary Club decided to clean-up the entire stretch of Sandy Hollow Road between the two historic cemeteries. He stated it was stunning to see the hundreds and hundreds of Nip Bottles they collected along that route. He stated that they also saw half full cans of spray paint floating on the edge of the Groton Reservoir. He stated at the end of the day he took ten large construction size plastic bags to the Transfer Station. He stated the Rotary Club planned to conduct another roadside clean-up in October, 2026; (7) Southeastern Connecticut Enterprise Region (seCTer) Board of Directors Meeting – April 22, 2026 – Mayor Allyn stated he attended the meeting this morning and he reported that seCTer has provided funding to 118 businesses in eastern Connecticut, with three being in Ledyard. He stated that seCTer still had money to loan and grant funding available for small business in their area; and he encouraged those looking to open a small business in Ledyard to contact seCTer.

### Questions to the Mayor

Councilor Ryan stated that he was extremely disappointed to hear that House Bill #5407 “*An Act Concerning State Reimbursement to Municipalities for Revenue Lost Due to the Property Tax Exemption for Veterans with a One Hundred Percent Permanent and Total Disability Rating*” was not getting a lot of traction. He questioned whether it was leaders from the rest of the State were not supporting the Bill. Mayor Allyn stated some towns presented positive and favorable testimony on HB #5407; however, he stated the 100% local property tax exemption for veterans who have a 100% service-connected permanent and total disabled rating does not have the same impact as it does for those who were a military community. He stated in addition to Southeastern Connecticut that both East Haven and New Haven also had a substantial loss in local tax revenues. He stated when the Southeastern Connecticut Council of Government (SECOG) Leaders meet with their Regional Delegation on Monday, April 27, 2026 at the State Capital in Hartford, that he hoped he would hear from other Leaders why they do not want to support other parts of the state they live in. Councilor Ryan questioned whether Ledyard’s State Delegation was supporting HB #5407. Mayor Allyn stated everybody from Southeastern Connecticut Delegation was doing their part. He noted that he had a conversation with State Representative Dan Gaiowski, who was a great young Representative from the New London area, noting that he was a member of the Veterans and Military Affairs Committee, and the Appropriations Committee. He stated that Representative Gaiowski, understands that the 100% Tax Abatement for Disabled Veterans was a huge loss of tax revenues for Southeastern Connecticut Municipalities, noting that he was 100% on-board and that he was advocating for the Legislature to approve HB #5407. Councilor Ryan stated HB #5407 would fill a significant hole in Ledyard’s revenues and that they were all hopeful that the State would come through with reimbursing the municipalities for the loss in their local tax revenues for the upcoming Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget cycle.

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated that she was away for the April 16, 2026 Southeastern Connecticut Council of Governments (SECOG) meeting regarding Public Law 25-01 “*Housing Law*”; therefore, she questioned whether it was recorded. Mayor Allyn stated the meeting was on Zoom; however, he did not know if it was recorded. He also noted that North Stonington attended the April 16, 2026 presentation that was held here in Ledyard, noting that SECOG was trying to meet with a couple of towns at a time.

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry noted that she saw some Facebook postings about a solar farm on Lantern Hill Road; and she questioned whether Mayor Allyn had any information regarding that project. Mayor Allyn stated the solar farm on Lantern Hill Road was going to be in Stonington. He explained that they would be paving over prime farmland soil for the 20-year term of the solar farm, and he commented that he did not think that was an appropriate use of prime farmland. He stated co-locating solar panels on school and municipal building roofs like Ledyard has done was being resourceful. Councilor Garcia-Irizarry noted that she agreed with Mayor Allyn’s comments.

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry continued by asking whether there has been any progress regarding the potential to use the former capped Landfill, located at 889 Colonel Ledyard Highway, for a Solar Array Farm. Mayor Allyn stated that the town would most likely need to hire a Consultant to determine how they could lay out a Ballasted Solar Array Farm and to help write the Request for Proposals (RFP). He stated when the town was previously working with Green Sky Energy that they were going to put monopoles in the ground at the capped Landfill to mount the solar panels. However, he stated because they were not allowed to penetrate the capped Landfill they could not drive the monopoles into the Landfill. Therefore, he stated that it financially did not make sense for Green Sky Energy to install weighted ballasted to mount the solar panels to. He stated although he did not know if it was now possible to construct a Solar Array Farm on the former capped Landfill that it was worth looking into.

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated because there was a lot of discussion on Facebook regarding the construction of a Solar Array Farm on the former Landfill that for the benefit of the public that she wanted to review the process of how town initiatives were accomplished. She proceeded to explain that that members of the Town Council could propose something and then the Mayor would look at it with the Public Works Director to determine whether it was viable to proceed with the initiative. However, she stated if it was not a viable, then it would not proceed. She stated with regard to using the capped Landfill for a Solar Array Farm that they were at the stage to see if it was a viable use of that property. She stated many times the

members of the Town Council do not know all the details of how something works, which was the reason they had experts at the Town Hall; and they were appreciative of their help.

Chairman St. Vil noted that Councilor Garcia-Irizarry brought up a good point, in that there was a lot of fake news and misinformation out there. He asked that folks go to the right people and the right organization if they had questions about what was going on in town.

Chairman St. Vil continued by noting that 2026 was a special year because it was America's 250<sup>th</sup> Birthday. He stated that he shared Mayor Allyn's Facebook Post regarding the Fundraiser to help support some of the activities that would be happening in town this summer. He asked how the Town Council could help and partner with the America 250 Planning Committee. Mayor Allyn stated that it would be great to have all of the Town Council involved in the Memorial Day Parade, noting that they were going to have a float and that he would love to have anyone who wanted to participate involved with the float. He stated that they would help by spreading the word regarding the planned events, especially the Nathan Lester House events that would be held on Saturday, July 4, 2026. He stated they were going to have colonel reenactors and a lot of things going on that day. He stated being on July 4<sup>th</sup> could be a challenge because people may have other plans, however, he stated that the town and the 250 America Planning Committee would like to have a good turnout at the Nathan Lester House event; and for the day to be a success. He stated spreading the word would be very beneficial.

Finance Committee

- 4. Discussion and possible action regarding the Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget.

Chairman St. Vil stated in accordance with Chapter VII; Section 5, of the Town Charter, that after the Public Hearing, which was held on April 21, 2026, the Town Council could make additional adjustments to the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 in preparation to submitting the budget to the townspeople at the Annual Town Meeting scheduled for May 18, 2026 that would adjourn to the Referendum Vote on May 19, 2026. However, he stated as he mentioned earlier this evening (X. Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Update) the Town Council did not receive any

public comments that were either in-favor or opposed to the proposed budget that was presented at the Public Hearing, noting that no budget adjustments were requested. He noted in accordance with the Chapter VII; Section 5 of Town Charter, the Town Council was required to file the proposed budget in the Town Clerk's Office by the first Monday in May (May 4, 2026). He asked Councilor Buhle to put a Motion on the floor.

- ❖ MOTION to adopt a the Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget in the amount of \$73, 555,506 comprised of:
  - General Government: \$31,698,171
  - Board of Education: \$41,857,335

Moved by Councilor Buhle, seconded by Councilor Garcia-Irizarry

Discussion: Councilor Ryan stated unfortunately he was not able to attend the Town Council's April 8, 2026 meeting at which time they made some reductions to the Board of Education's proposed budget, noting that he would like to have seen more of a reduction. He went on to note during the Finance Committee's April 1, 2026 meeting he presented a proposed reduction to the Board of Education's proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget, that was exclusively pointed at trying to reduce any new hires, noting that they did not want to have any new recurring costs in a year with so many variables. He stated because his proposal was not met favorably, that he openly stated that he was willing to compromise; and then he asked if there was a number the Finance Committee was willing to talk about. He stated because the response was "None" that Finance Committee meeting ended without an agreement on the budget. Therefore, he stated that he was happy to see the \$75,000 reduction that the Town Council made.

Councilor Ryan went on to state that he believed the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget was reasonable on both sides for the most part. However, as he has said at previous meetings, he thought there was room to improve on the Board of Education's side of the budget. He stated in the interest of time that he would hesitantly support the budget as presented this evening.

Councilor Ryan continued by commenting on the impact of the 2025 Revaluation, noting if residents have not done the quick math on their own tax numbers, that he would encourage them to do so. He stated his property assessment went up 58%, which was above the average. He stated based on the normalized/adjusted/equalized mill rate his taxes were going to go up \$1,500, noting that he was not alone. He stated that he hoped he wrong, but as they vote tonight, everyone should be prepared for the backlash, noting when residents receive their new tax bills in July they were going to see a huge tax increase. He stated while they were saying the Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget was only 4.5% increase; that was not what residents were going to see in their tax bills because of the 2025 Revaluation. Therefore, he stated that they had to be prepared for angry residents, because the increase in their property taxes was not going to be insubstantial. He stated as they have been discussing, if Ledyard does have the fortune to receive the new revenue streams in the middle of the year, such as HB #5407 and improvements to the Education Cost Sharing (ECS) formula, that it was not going to matter because the budget would have already been approved; and the tax bills would have already gone out. He stated if additional revenues come-in during the year that the Town would have taxed the residents more than what they actually needed.

Councilor Ryan concluded his comments by stating that he has gone on record saying that they could only work with what they know to be the case relative to state and federal revenues, which was the reason he has been advocating for more reductions on the Board of

Education's side of the budget. He noted although the Town Council cannot make line item reductions, that he has tried to encourage the Board of Education to reduce new recurring expenses. He stated regardless of whether impact of 2025 Revaluation and budget increase comes out at the Town Meeting; or it comes out in July with the tax bills, at that point, that he would fully expect to see people come to their meetings at that point.

Councilor Garacia-Irizarry questioned when the State Legislative Session would end. Mayor Allyn, III, stated that the 2026 Legislative Session would end on May 7, 2026. Councilor Garcia-Irizarry noted that the Town would know the status of their State Revenues relative to HB #5407 and their Education Cost Sharing (ECS) before the May 19, 2026 Budget Referendum. Mayor Allyn stated that they would most likely have that information before the Budget Referendum, and he explained they typically try to set mill rate no later than the fourth Monday in June; therefore, the Town Council could adjust the mill rate based on the new revenues. He went on to explain because the Town uses a company to print the tax bills that they try to set the mill rate as soon as possible, because the tax bill company would have to run a test before the printing and mailing of the tax bills.

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry questioned the equalized/adjusted mill rate. Councilor Buhle stated equalized/adjusted mill rate was 25.78.

Councilor Buhle explained when the townspeople were voting on the Annual Budget that they were approving the expenditure side of the budget, noting that they were not voting on the revenue side of the budget. She stated while they have to make sure that the budgeted expenditures and revenues were equal; that in terms of setting the mill rate it could be adjusted if new revenue information comes in after the Referendum, noting that the Charter required the mill rate to be set prior to the first day of July. She stated even with an equalized mill rate of 25.78 that many residents were going to see a large tax increase, because the commercial and industrial property valuations essentially remained flat, shifting a bigger portion of the tax burden onto residential properties; and motor vehicles. She stated that she did not think they had the opportunity to develop a budget that would not have that burden. She stated that she believed the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget was responsible.

Councilor Buhle continued by addressing the Finance Committee’s April 1, 2026 meeting during which she told Councilor Ryan that she ardently would not support a reduction to the Board of Education’s Budget. However, she stated after a long discussion at the Town Council’s April 8, 2026 meeting she did vote “Yes” to reduce the Board of Education’s Budget by \$75,000. She stated although Councilor Ryan was not at that Town Council meeting the \$75,000 reduction to the Board of Education’s proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 was unanimously approved by those in attendance. She stated that she hoped the Town Council would move the proposed Fiscal Year 2026/2027 Budget forward to the townspeople this evening; and that the townspeople would agree with them.

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING  
ADMINISTRATOR/DEPARTMENT HEAD BENEFITS

WHEREAS, The Town Council recognizes the need to compensate its Administrators/Department Heads in a fair and equitable manner;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Town Council reaffirms the practices, policies, plans and benefits set forth in the Town of Ledyard Employee Handbook which applies to all Employees, including Administrators/Department Heads and provides further that if the terms of this Resolution differ from the terms of the Town of Ledyard Employee Handbook, the provisions and terms of this Resolution shall apply exclusively.

For the purpose of this Resolution, the Town Council Chairperson shall be the immediate supervisor of the Administrative Assistant to the Town Council; the Chairperson of the Town Council Finance Committee shall be the immediate supervisor for the Town Treasurer; the Director of Finance shall be the immediate supervisor for the Assistant Director of Finance; the Mayor shall be the immediate supervisor for all other Administrators/Department Heads.

All benefits are computed based on a 40-hour work week. Benefits for employees working less than 40 hours will be pro-rated based on a 40-hour work week.

As of the date of this revision there are 17 non-union positions covered by the Administrator /Department Head Resolution:

3. Assistant Director of Finance/Treasurer

### **LEAVES AND ABSENCES**

All leaves and absences are based on a 40 hour work week. Leave and absences for employees working less than 40 hours will be pro-rated based on a 40 hour work week.

### **SPECIAL LEAVE**

Special Holiday leave shall be granted on the days, or portions thereof, listed below:

- a. December 24, whenever it occurs on a Monday;
- b. December 24, after having worked one-half of their normal daily work schedule, whenever it occurs on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday;
- c. December 26, whenever it occurs on a Friday;
- d. December 31, whenever it occurs on a Monday;
- e. December 31, after having worked one-half of their normal daily work schedule, whenever it occurs on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday;
- f. January 2, whenever it occurs on a Friday.

The above Holiday leave may be adjusted based on Town Hall schedules; e.g. if union contracts are negotiated to allow the Town Hall to be open on any of these days compensatory time-off may be granted.

The Administrators/Department Heads whose duties and responsibilities require them to work during periods of special leave shall be eligible for equivalent amounts of compensatory time off.

### **LEAVE OF ABSENCE WITHOUT PAY**

All requests for a Leave of Absence Without Pay must be made in writing and approved in advance by the Mayor. If the leave is for more than five (5) days in any one month, the Administrator/Department Head shall not earn sick or vacation leave for that month. The Administrator/Department Head shall not be paid for any holiday or special leave day which may occur during the Leave of Absence Without Pay. In order to qualify to be paid for a holiday or a special leave day, an Administrator/Department Head who has been on a Leave of Absence Without Pay must have worked the last work day directly preceding said holiday or special leave day.

### **SICK LEAVE TERMINATION**

Upon termination of service from the Town of Ledyard, all unused sick leave up to a maximum of fifty (50) days will be paid to the Administrator/Department Head in a lump sum payment, provided the individual has been an Employee of the Town for a minimum of ten (10) years, and said Administrator/Department Head is not terminated for cause.

Employees hired on or after July 1, 2014 with a minimum of ten (10) consecutive years of service will upon termination be paid for a maximum of twenty (20) days.

### **PERSONAL LEAVE**

Each Administrator/Department Head shall be entitled to three (3) personal leave days annually without loss of pay, provided such Administrator/Department Head notifies the Supervisor at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance, except in the case of a personal emergency. Personal days may be used in conjunction with a holiday or vacation provided a two (2) week written notice is supplied to the Supervisor and provided approval is granted by the Supervisor. During an Employee's first fiscal year, he or she shall be eligible for one (1) personal day for every four (4) months worked.

### **COMPENSATORY TIME**

Administrator/Department Heads may, with the advanced approval of the Supervisor or Mayor, be provided compensation in the form of compensatory time at the rate of one hour of compensatory time for each hour worked in excess of the maximum work week of each employee. Salaried exempt employees shall be eligible for compensatory time off for work

performed which is beyond the normal scope of duties. All compensatory time must be taken within ~~three~~ **six** months, unless otherwise approved by immediate supervisor. Compensatory time which is not taken within ~~three~~ **six** months of accrual will be forfeited.

### **INSURANCE**

The Town shall continue to provide eligible Employees and their dependents substantially similar group health, ~~and~~ dental, ~~and~~ **vision** insurance coverage and benefits as exist in the Town's

conventional insurance plan. The Town reserves the right to change or provide alternate insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, or benefit levels or to self-insure as it deems appropriate for any form or portion of insurance coverage, so long as the new coverage and benefits are substantially similar to the conventional insurance. The Town will not be responsible for changes unilaterally imposed by an insurance provider so long as the Town uses its best efforts to minimize changes by incumbent insurance providers from one plan year to another.

~~Each Employee shall be responsible for fifty percent (50%) of the cost of the dental plan for spouse or family coverage, and the applicable Employee contribution rate, as set forth below, for the Employee's dental coverage.~~

- a. The Town will purchase for each Employee at no cost to Employee, life insurance which in the event of death of the Employee while employed by the Town, will provide a benefit of \$50,000 or a sum equivalent to the Employee's base salary, whichever is less.
- b. Effective with the adoption of this Resolution, each employee shall be responsible for the percentage of the applicable conventional premium rate determined by the insurance carrier or administrator for all health, ~~and~~-dental *and vision* benefits as outlined in Paragraph c below.
- c. Effective July 1, 2010 and each July 1 following, the co-insurance and co-pay contributions shall be the same as the lowest negotiated Town Hall labor contracts effective on that date.
- d. Employees may elect to waive all group insurance benefits, and in lieu thereof, be remunerated in the amount of twenty-five percent (25%) of the actual premium saved.
- e. Employees are required to notify Human Resources of significant changes to circumstances affecting insurance, including but not limited to births, death of dependents, marriage, adoptions, divorce, or change in eligibility of dependents.

### RETIREMENT

Employees hired prior to July 1, 2009 may be eligible to participate in the town's Defined Benefit Pension Plan. Details of this plan are provided in the Defined Benefit Summary Plan Description which will be provided to all eligible employees.

Employees hired on or after July 1, 2009 may be eligible to participate in the town's Defined Contribution Pension Plan. Details of this plan are provided in the Defined Contribution Summary Plan Description which will be provided to all eligible employees.

Effective July 1, 2022 employees eligible for the Defined Contribution Plan will be automatically enrolled at date of hire at a contribution rate of ten percent (10%) of base salary. The Town will match the employee's contribution effective six months after the date of hire. *The Town will match the employee's contribution up to 12% or highest union contract amount, whichever is higher.*

### WORKERS' COMPENSATION

If an Employee is injured in the performance of his or her duties or is otherwise qualified for benefits under the Workers' Compensation Act, the net after tax difference between his or her regular base pay and Workers' Compensation shall be paid by the Employer for a period not to exceed six (6) months or until maximum recovery is attained (whichever is first.)

Until a determination is made as to the eligibility for Workers' Compensation payments, absences shall be charged, at the Employee's option, to accumulated sick leave and/or vacation time, provided eligibility requirements are met. The Employee's time will be credited when compensation becomes effective.

Notwithstanding the above, if the Town, in its sole discretion, advances pay before an eligibility determination is made, and the Employee is thereafter found ineligible or the Employee's eligibility is terminated for any reason, the deficiency shall be charged at the Employee's option to accumulated sick leave and/or accumulated vacation leave. However, if an Employee has not accumulated sufficient sick and/or annual leave to cover the period of absence; the Employee shall be considered on leave with pay and shall be required to repay the Town for any salary advanced while on leave with pay in the following manner:

- a. Sick Leave
- b. Vacation
- c. Personal Leave
- d. Incentives
- e. Wages
- f. Welfare Benefits

**WAGES AND COMPENSATION**

Employees shall be paid at the rate as designated by the Mayor or contractually negotiated. *However, nothing in this provision shall limit the authority of the Town Council: (i) to make adjustments during the annual budget process to the rates designated by the Mayor for positions not in the classified service; or (ii) to make adjustments to salary changes recommended by the Mayor during the fiscal year for positions not in the classified service.* Increases in wages shall be effective on the first day of July; and continuing until June 30 *of the year this resolution is up for review, 2025,* wage increases may not be less than the percentage of the highest union contracted increase for that fiscal year.

Employees required to be available via cell phone outside of regular work hours who are not issued a Town cell phone, shall receive a monthly stipend for usage of their personal cell phone at a rate equivalent to the highest stipend paid to any of the Town’s bargaining units.

~~With the implementation of this Resolution, retroactive reimbursement for wages and personal cell phones shall be paid to employees who were on staff as of July 1, 2022.~~

**EDUCATION AND TRAINING**

The Administrator/Department Head shall be reimbursed for travel expenses, meals, lodging, registration fees and other appropriate expenses as may be required when attending professional meetings, training and/or conducting Town business, provided prior approval to attend such meeting and incur such expenses is obtained from the immediate supervisor.

Any Administrator/Department Head who successfully completes an education or vocational course approved, in advance, by the immediate supervisor shall be reimbursed the cost of such courses up to a maximum of fifty percent (50%) not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) per year. Courses eligible for reimbursement must be at an accredited college or university and directly relate to the Administrator/Department Head’s professional development. Employees who receive tuition reimbursement shall remain in the employment of the Town for one year following completion of the course or shall be required to reimburse the tuition.

**LONGEVITY**

In return for good and faithful service to the Town, each Administrator/Department Head shall receive the following longevity payments:

Discussion: Councilor Garcia-Irizarry explained the reason the proposed “*Resolution Establishing Administrator Department Head Benefits*” was being presented this evening was because it was required to be reviewed by the Town Council and the Administrator/Department Heads every three years. Therefore, she stated there were not a lot of proposed changes to the document. She continued by reviewing each of the changes as noted in the draft Resolution (see above) stating the most significant change was to the “*Wages and Compensation*” paragraph. She stated most of the changes were to update position titles, and to be consistent with current practices as well as other labor groups in town.

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry noted in response to an email she received from a resident that asked about the employee’s contribution for the cost of the Dental Plan, that she spoke with Human Resources Director Christine Dias. She noted that Ms. Dias explained that the Administrator Department Heads’ contribution would be the same as the lowest labor group, noting as an example, that if the labor groups were contributing 19% for the Dental Plan that the Administrator Department Heads’ contribution would also be 19%.

Councilor Ryan commented on the additional language in “*Wages and Compensation*” paragraph, and he noted that it was same process the Town Council has been doing. He stated that the Town Council approved the salaries as part of the budget process, noting that authority was already in the Town Charter. Therefore, he questioned whether the additional language in the Resolution was reiterating what was already in the Town Charter, noting that the Town Charter would overrule anything that was in the proposed Resolution. Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated that she had a long conversation with Attorney Matt Ritter to develop the proper wording. She explained the wording they agreed on was that the Mayor would determine the Administrator Department Heads’ salaries and it gives the Town Council the opportunity to adjust the salaries either during the budget process; or during the year, if Mayor requested a salary adjustment during the year. She provided clarification regarding making a salary adjustment during the fiscal year, stating that the Mayor would have to initiate the proposed salary adjustment; and then the Town Council would act on the request. Councilor Ryan stated that the process Councilor Garcia-Irizarry was describing has always been the case, noting that the Town Council has to approve salaries, stating that was what they did as part of the budget process. He stated to be clear that the additional language was reiterating the Town Council’s power as provided in the Town Charter.

Councilor Garcia-Irizarry stated that she reviewed the Town Charter in detail with Attorney Matt Ritter, and more specifically the *Classified Service Employees*. She stated that she and Attorney Ritter agreed that there were some areas in the Town Charter that were confusing; and that those areas would need to be clarified with the next Charter Revision. She stated the wording in the *Wages and Compensation*” paragraph was drafted by the Town Attorney. Councilor Ryan stated that he wanted to clarify that despite the Resolution having different wording, that it was not in conflict with the Town Charter; and that it was indicative of their current practice, which was that the Mayor proposed salaries in the Annual Budget and the

Town Council has actually in some cases changed salaries. Councilor Garcia-Irizarry explained that the proposed language in “*Wages and Compensation*” paragraph addressed what happened during last year’s (fy 25/26) budget process with regard to the salaries.

In addition, authorize the Mayor to solicit Requests for Proposals (RFP) to lease the Clark Farm Property located 1025 Colonel Ledyard Highway (Route 117) for Agricultural purposes.

Moved by Councilor Thompson, seconded by Councilor Ryan

Discussion: Councilor Thompson stated that Mr. Majcher leased the Clark Farm property to grow haye for many years. He stated that Mr. Majcher decided not to continue when his lease ended this past March, 2026. He explained at the request of the Agricultural Commission the Land Use/Planning/Public Works Committee incorporated some suggestions into the Lease that were provided by the Agricultural Commission to ensure the property continue to be used for agricultural purposes.

Chairman St. Vil addressed the five (5) year term contained in the proposed lease. He questioned whether the term of the lease could be modified noting that the Board of Education was conducting a Facilities Assessment Study to review the High School’s current physical plan to evaluate ways to mitigate facilities erosion at the High School. He explained that the study would outline the prioritization of needs, and costs relative to the following paths forward: repair; renovate; or build a new High School on the exiting lot. He stated should this work result in building a new High School that the Clark Farm was the only town-owned property that was large enough to accommodate a new school. He also asked whether the town could access the Clark Farm if it was being leased to conduct perk tests and other soil samplings to determine whether the property could be used for a new High School. He stated that he did not know the probability of the Clark Farm property being used for a new High School, however, he stated that he would like to keep that opportunity open.

Mayor Allyn explained that the Clark Farm did not have a usage restriction on it; like the former Norwich State Property does. Therefore, he stated the Clark Farm property could be used for anything. He stated before he prepared the Request for Proposals (RFP) to lease the Clark Farm that he could add the following clauses to the draft lease:

- Right to Enter for purposes of testing – The landlord reserved the right to enter for the purpose of conducting subsurface testing, etc., if needed; and they would return the ground to as close to original condition as possible, when they were done.
- Early Termination clause, such as any time after year three or year four, the Town had the right to terminate the lease if the need existed.

The mover and seconder agreed to amend the draft Clark Farm Lease to include the clauses as described by Mayor Allyn, III, above as a “friendly amendment”

- Right to Enter for purposes of testing
- Early Termination clause

WHEREAS, All persons are afforded a right to full and equal housing opportunities in the neighborhood of their choice; and

WHEREAS, Federal Fair Housing laws require that all individuals, regardless of race, color, religion, sex, handicap, familial status, veteran status, or national origin, be given equal access to all housing-related opportunities, including rental and homeownership opportunities, and be allowed to make free choices regarding housing location; and

WHEREAS, Connecticut fair housing laws require that all individuals, regardless of race, creed, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, marital status, age, lawful source of income, familial status, veteran status, learning disability, physical or mental disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity or expression be given equal access to all housing-related opportunities, including rental and home ownership opportunities, and be allowed to make free choices regarding housing location; and

WHEREAS, The Town of Ledyard is committed to upholding these laws, and realizes that these laws must be supplemented by an Affirmative Statement publicly endorsing the right of all people to full and equal housing opportunities in the neighborhood of their choice.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Town of Ledyard hereby endorses a Fair Housing Policy to ensure equal opportunity for all persons to rent, purchase, obtain financing and enjoy all other housing-related services of their choice on a non-discriminatory basis as provided by state and federal law; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the chief executive officer of the Town of Ledyard or his/her designated representative is responsible for responding to and assisting any person who alleges to be the victim of an illegal discriminatory housing practice in the Town of Ledyard and for advising such person of the right to file a complaint with the State of Connecticut Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO) or the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) or to seek assistance from the CT Fair Housing Center, legal services, or other fair housing organizations to protect his or her right to equal housing opportunities.

I would like to share my comments in response to the letter from the Board of Education Chairman that was addressed to the Ledyard Town Council on March 30<sup>th</sup> 2026 and attached to the April 8<sup>th</sup> 2026 Town Council agenda.

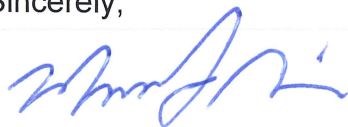
Regarding the first item referencing the Board of Education FY 2024-2025 audit surplus of \$212,031 and the related transfer of the funds to the Board of Education Capital Non-Recurring (CNR) account, as I have stated on more than one occasion publicly, these funds cannot go directly in the Board of Education's CNR account as based on the legislation, these funds are not strictly capital in nature. Additionally, I had asked the auditor about this during the audit presentation at the finance committee meeting on February 4<sup>th</sup>, 2026. He agreed with my assertion. I would also like to point out that both the Superintendent and Board of Education chair were present at that meeting. The correct course of action is for the Council to authorize the appropriation and transfer of these funds to a new non-lapsing Board of Education fund that would be set up solely for the intended purposes of this legislation. If the Board of Education wishes to utilize these funds for capital purposes, they are certainly entitled to do that, but it would take Board action to move the funds from the new non-lapsing fund into the Board of Education CNR account as that is spelled out in the legislation.

Regarding the \$19,943 reimbursement from Eversource, the original expenditures took place in fiscal year 2024-2025. When the Board of Education finance office sent the check over to the Town finance department, there was a request to net it against the expenditure account that these funds were originally expensed out of in fiscal year 2024-2025. As that year was already closed out, that was not feasible. The check was deposited into the general fund

miscellaneous revenue account. I instructed the Board of Ed finance director that the best course of action would be to initiate a formal request to Town Council to transfer these funds into the Board of Education's CNR account. I have no issue with moving the funds, but it is going to require Town Council action to do so.

It should also be noted that per the Town Charter, as both of these items are non-budgeted appropriations, they will require Town Council action in order to be moved.

- 7) Further, the \$75,000 is money that might be utilized well by other Town Commissions, like Beautification, Historical, Economic Development and others. It does not belong to Planning simply because it is a result of a Blight sale anymore than funds from speeding tickets belong to the Police Dept.
- 8) Finally, from a humane and concerning standpoint regarding Seniors in our lovely town, losing capabilities could happen to any one of us. We can lose our ability to care for our property, or contact Legal representation, or reach out to relatives in far off locations. And then here we are. Frankly, I'm ashamed of what happened here, as much as I am alarmed. I am asking you, as elected representatives to look into these facts and act. Please, you can see these issues.

**MEMORANDUM OF LAW**

The Respondents, Chairman, Town Council of the Town of Ledyard (the “**Chair**”), Town Council of the Town of Ledyard (the “**Town Council**”), and the Town of Ledyard (the “**Town**”) (collectively, the “**Respondents**”), hereby respectfully submit this Memorandum of Law in opposition to the Complaint of Sharon Pealer (the “**Complainant**”). On or about October 12, 2025, the subject Freedom of Information Complaint (the “**Complaint**”) was filed with the Freedom of Information Commission (the “**Commission**”). For the reasons set forth below, the Complainant is not entitled to relief under *Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-225(c). Accordingly, the Complaint should be dismissed.

**FACTUAL BACKGROUND**

The Respondents are a “public agency,” as defined under the Freedom of Information Act (the “**Act**”). *Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-200(1). The Complaint derives from a municipal ordinance entitled an “*Ordinance Establishing a Code of Ethics and Ethics Commission for the Town of Ledyard*” (the “**First Ethics Ordinance**”), which the Respondents first considered in 2024. Town Council, Minutes, 13.<sup>1</sup> The Town Council first considered a holistic review of townwide ethics issues in May 2024, after hearing request from certain residents requesting the creation of an ethics

commission. Town Council, Minutes, May 22, 2024. The First Ethics Ordinance was referred to the Administration Committee of the Town Council of the Town of Ledyard (the “**Administration Committee**”) and discussed before this standing committee. *Id.*; Town Council, Minutes of the Administration Committee, Jun. 12, 2024, 19.

In 2025, the First Ethics Ordinance received considerable review and comment from the Administration Committee and the general public. For instance, on February 12, 2025, the Administration Committee discussed possible action to create an Ethics Commission. Town Council, Minutes of the Administration Committee, Feb. 12, 2025, 2-5. The Complainant was present for this discussion. *Id.* On March 12, 2025, the Administration Committee again discussed the First Ethics Ordinance. Town Council, Minutes of the Administration Committee, Mar. 12, 2025, 6-13. The Complainant appeared at this meeting and voiced her opposition to the action. *Id.* at 10-11. On September 10, 2025, after several additional hearings addressing the First Ethics Ordinance, the Administration Committee met to vote on the following agenda item:

- 1. Continued discussion and possible action to create an Ethics Commission for the Town of Ledyard.*

Town Council, Minutes of the Administration Committee, Sept. 10, 2025, 25. The Complainant appeared at this meeting. *Id.* at 1. After discussion concerning the First Ethics Ordinance and its language, the Administration Committee voted to recommend the First Ethics Ordinance to the Town Council and to set a public hearing for further discussion, which occurred on September 24, 2025 (the “**Public Hearing**”). *Id.* at 25. Members of the public, including the Complainant, appeared and commented on the First Ethics Ordinance. Town Council, Public Hearing Minutes, Sept. 24, 2025, 24.

Following the Public Hearing, the Town Council convened again on October 8, 2025 to address the First Ethics Ordinance. Specifically, Item 6 on the Town Council’s meeting agenda for its October 8 meeting (the “**October Agenda Item**”) noted:

6. *Discussion and possible action to review and consider text amendment to the proposed [First Ethics Ordinance] in preparation to present at a Public Hearing.*

Town Council, Minutes, Oct. 8, 2025, 12. Following discussion and analysis from each councilor present, the Town Council moved to: “amend the [First Ethics Ordinance]” in the manner set forth by the Town Council. *Id.* at 25. The motion was adopted with a 5-3 vote. *Id.* Next, the Town Council moved to: “adopt a proposed [First Ethics Ordinance] as presented in the drafted dated ~~September 10,~~ **October 8, 2025.**” *Id.* at 26. Again, the motion was adopted with a 5-3 vote. *Id.* at 28.

Section 12 of the Ledyard Town Charter (the “**Charter**”) sets forth the manner in which municipal ordinances are approved. Every ordinance must, before it becomes effective, be certified to the mayor within seven (7) days of final passage by the Town Council. Charter § 12. If approved, an ordinance becomes effective upon the mayor’s signing. If disapproved, the mayor must, within five (5) days of receiving the certified ordinance, return it to the Clerk of the Town Council and state specific reasons for the disapproval. *Id.* Notwithstanding the Mayor’s disapproval, the Town Council may override and pass the ordinance by affirmative vote of at least six (6) councilors within fourteen (14) days thereof. *Id.*

On October 16, 2025, the Mayor issued a letter to the Town Council disapproving of the First Ethics Ordinance (the “**Veto**”). *See* Letter, RE: Disapproval of Ordinance #100-021, Oct. 16, 2025.<sup>2</sup> Accordingly, the Town Council discussed the First Ethics Ordinance at its next regular meeting on October 22, 2025. Town Council, Minutes, Oct. 22, 2025, 35-6. The Complainant

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<sup>2</sup> A copy of the Veto is attached hereto and identified as **Exhibit A**.

attended this hearing and spoke again in opposition to the substance of the Ordinance. Town Council, Minutes, Oct. 22, 2025, 5-6. She also claimed the Respondents violated *Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-225(c) by acting on an agenda item without proper notice, and, accordingly, filed this Complaint. *Id.* at 6. Following further discussion on the First Ethics Ordinance and its passage, the Town Council voted 9-0 to “table” its motion to override the Veto. *Id.* at 36. In its next meeting, the Town Council elected, via 2-5 vote, *not* to remove the First Ethics Ordinance from the table. Town Council, Minutes, Oct. 29, 2025, 9. Absent any further override votes within the requisite fourteen (14) days, the First Ethics Ordinance did not take legal effect.

Rather, the Town Council proceeded with a newly drafted ethics ordinance (the “**Second Ethics Ordinance**”). As such, on October 29, 2025, the Administration Committee conducted an initial meeting on the Second Ethics Ordinance, considering new language based upon feedback from the Town Attorney. Town Council, Administration Committee Minutes, Oct. 29, 2025, 8-10.<sup>3</sup> The Administration Committee voted to recommend the Second Ethics Ordinance to the Town Council, setting it for a public hearing on November 10, 2025. *Id.* at 11, 24. The public hearing occurred as scheduled, with approximately thirteen (13) members of the public speaking on the Second Ethics Ordinance. *Id.* at 12-20. Two days later, the Town Council again considered adopting the Second Ethics Ordinance but elected instead to remand it back to the Administration Committee for further review.<sup>4</sup> Town Council, Minutes, Nov. 12, 2025, 12.

The Administration Committee discussed the Second Ethics Ordinance in its next three (3) meetings, voting on February 11, 2026 to recommend that the Town Council adopt the proposed

language.<sup>5</sup> Town Council, Administration Committee Minutes, Feb. 11, 2026, 15. The Administration Committee then revisited the Second Ethics Ordinance in its March 11, 2026 meeting, recommending it to the Town Council for approval and setting it for another public hearing on March 25, 2026. Town Council, Minutes, Mar. 11, 2026, 14. Finally, at its April 8, 2026 meeting, the Town Council considered additional revisions and technical changes to the proposed Second Ethics Ordinance, remitting it yet again to the Administration Committee for further review and recommendation during its May 13, 2026 meeting. Town Council, Minutes, Apr. 8, 2026, 28. Thus, to date, the Respondents have not adopted any ethics ordinance.

The Complainant filed the instant Complaint on October 12, 2025, alleging that, by adopting the First Ethics Ordinance at the October 8, 2025 meeting, the Respondents violated *Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-225(c). On December 10, 2025, the Respondents scheduled an FOIC training with the Commission's Director of Education & Communications, Russell Blair.<sup>6</sup> On February 10, 2026, Mr. Blair conducted two (2) separate training sessions for town employees, elected officials, and appointed officers. Despite these trainings, the eventual Veto of the First Ethics Ordinance, and having multiple opportunities to publicly address the First Ethics Ordinance, the Complainant has not elected to withdraw this action.

### **LEGAL STANDARD**

The Commission has the authority to investigate all alleged violations of the Act, which may include, *inter alia*, conducting a fact-finding hearing, administering oaths, examining witnesses, and receiving evidence. *Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-205(d). This authority is construed broadly, and, absent an unreasonable, arbitrary, or illegal decision, or some other abuse of

discretion, the Commission's factual findings are upheld. *Conn. Gen. Stat.* §§ 4-166 – 4-189; *Board of Selectmen of the Town of Ridgefield v. Freedom of Information Commission*, 294 Conn. 438, 446 (2010).

*Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-225(c) establishes requirements for noticing regular public agency meetings. Specifically, the agenda of such meetings shall be available to the public and filed in the appropriate location at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the meeting subject to the notice. *Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-225(c). The notice must “fairly apprise the public of the proposed action.” *Zoning Board of Appeals of the Town of Plainfield v. FOIC*, Docket No. CV-99-0497917-S, 2000 WL 765186 \*1, \*3 (Conn. Super. Ct., May 3, 2000). The purpose of this requirement is to ensure that the public and interested parties may have the opportunity to properly prepare and be present to express their views on the specific agenda item. *Koepke v. Zoning Board of Appeals*, 25 Conn. App. 611, 617 (1991). The Commission has routinely held that “it is inherent in the meeting agenda that the business included therein might be considered *and* acted upon, including by way of a vote, at the meeting.” *Quaranta v. First Selectman, Board of Selectmen, Town of Roxbury*, Docket No. FIC 2023-0180 (Mar. 13, 2024)(quoting *Patricia Mechare v. Andrea Downs, Chairman, Board of Ed., Reg. Sch. Dist. 1*, Docket No. FIC 2015-534 (May 11, 2016)) (emphasis in original).

### LEGAL ARGUMENT

**A. The Complainant was fairly apprised of the nature of the October Agenda Item and was afforded a fair opportunity to prepare and present her views in connection therewith.**

The Complainant had a fair opportunity to prepare her position in connection with the First Ethics Ordinance, attend the October 8, 2025 meeting, and deliver her views on the specific agenda item. This case is nearly indistinguishable from *Quaranta*, whereby the Commission dismissed a

claim for relief under *Conn. Gen. Stat.* § 1-225(d), which contains a similar 24-hour notice requirement for special agency meetings. *Quaranta*, Docket No. FIC 2023-0180 (Mar. 13, 2024). The Commission has applied the “fair appraisal” standard to meetings noticed pursuant to both §§ 1-225(c) and 1-225(d). *See id.*; *see also Lowthert v. Freedom of Information Comm’n*, Docket No. HHB-CV15-602890-S, 2016 WL 571077 \*1, \*5 (Conn. Super. Ct. Jan. 15, 2016) (determining notices pursuant to § 1-225(c) must “provide[ ] at least some level of meaningful disclosure about the subject matter of a public agency meeting.”).

In that instance, a town’s board of selectmen noticed a special meeting for a “budget workshop” without indicating whether such meeting would conduct a vote or possible vote. *Id.* Accordingly, in voting to approve the municipal budget and advance it to the board of finance, the board did not violate the Act, as the agenda was specific enough to fairly apprise the public that it would discuss *and* possibly vote on the budget. *Id.* Similarly, in *Mechare*, a public agency did not violate the Act by voting on an agenda item entitled “anticipated executive session for purpose of superintendent evaluation and contract,” as it fairly apprised the public that the item could be both considered and acted on. Nor did a board of education violate the Act when it voted to send a construction project to public referendum after voting on an agenda item entitled “Discussion of Building Project Strategies.” *Kronfeld v. Board of Education, Regional School District No. 12*, Docket No. 2007-249 (Nov. 28, 2007). These FOIC complaints were all dismissed, despite using more ambiguous language than that found within the October Agenda Item.

The October Agenda Item fairly apprised the public, including the Complainant, that the Town Council would consider, and potentially vote on, the First Ethics Ordinance. Town Council, Minutes, Oct. 8, 2025, 12. The October Agenda Item identified the specific ordinance under consideration and sufficiently described it to the general public as the subject of the Town

Council's action. The language was also consistent with prior agenda items that the Administration Committee drafted in previous meetings addressing the First Ethics Ordinance. Finally, the Ethics Ordinance had been part of a long and robust public discussion, beginning more than one (1) year prior to the contested vote. The Complainant attended and participated in several of these discussions. And while the October Agenda Item did not explicitly spell out an impending vote, the context surrounding the passage of the First Ethics Ordinance demonstrates a fair and transparent foundation built upon meaningful public input. The Respondents did not violate the letter of the spirit of *Conn. Gen. Stat. § 1-225(c)*. The Complaint should be dismissed.

**B. Even if the Respondents *did* violate § 1-225(c), which they did not, any error was harmless and subsequently rectified and further penalties under the Act are unwarranted.**

The Respondents have taken all necessary steps to mitigate any unintended consequences following the Town Council's vote on the First Ethics Ordinance. As an initial matter, the First Ethics Ordinance never took legal effect. The Mayor vetoed it, and the Town Council never voted to override the Veto. Instead, the Town Council returned to the drafting table in earnest, preparing the Second Ethics Ordinance, which has been thoroughly examined in multiple public hearings before the Administration Committee. The Complainant has not participated in those discussions. To date, the Respondents have not adopted any ethics ordinance. It would therefore be superfluous for the Commission to declare the First Ethics Ordinance, or any approval thereof, null and void. It is already so, by virtue of the Veto.

More importantly, the Respondents have proactively participated in two (2) training sessions. Using experts from the Commission, the Respondents have assisted in training hired employees, appointees, and elected officials alike on the intricacies of the Act. The Respondents have undertaken all reasonable measures to promote satisfactory compliance with the Act moving

forward. Any further order from the Commission ordering additional training would be similarly superfluous.

Nor is a fine warranted under these specific circumstances. The Respondents did not unreasonably withhold any documents in connection with the October Agenda Item. *See Chief of Staff v. Freedom of Information Comm'n*, 25 Conn. L. Rptr. 270, 273 (Conn. Super Ct. Aug. 12, 1999). Most, if not all, items relevant to this dispute are available for public review and inspection. Nor have the Respondents demonstrated a pattern of consistent noncompliance with the Act, especially with respect to the ordinances it has noticed and adopted. Therefore, the Commission should not assess any fines against the Respondents.

At best, the Complaint *possibly* demonstrates that the Respondents, through harmless inadvertence, did not strictly follow the Act to the letter. But they have still substantially complied with it, and the Complainant has meaningfully engaged in the public process. Under the aforementioned circumstances, the most stringent remedy available to the Complainant would be an order requiring that the Respondents strictly comply with *Conn. Gen. Stat. § 1-225(c)*. *Dumas v. Town of Stratford et al.*, Docket No. 2016-0809 (May 10, 2017). However, for the reasons set forth above, a dismissal is appropriate.

### **CONCLUSION**

The October Agenda Item fairly apprised the public, and, more specifically, the Complainant, of the general nature of the First Ethics Ordinance. The Respondents did not frustrate the underlying purpose of *Conn. Gen. Stat. § 1-225(c)*. Even so, the First Ethics Ordinance never had the effect of law, and the Respondents have taken appropriate steps to train and educate staff, elected officers, and appointees, on the Act. The Complaint should be dismissed.

In accordance with the Town Charter, I am transmitting "Ordinance Establishing a Town of Ledyard Code of Ethics and Ethics Commission for the Town of Ledyard" which the Mayor stated his disapproval in his letter dated October 16, 2025 listing his reasons for not approving the proposed Ordinance.

Chapter III, Section 12 of the Town Charter states the following:

*Every ordinance, except an emergency ordinance or an ordinance relating to the Town Council or its procedures, shall, before it becomes effective, be certified to the Mayor for his approval within seven (7) days of the final passage by the Town Council. The Mayor shall sign the proposed ordinance, if he approves it, whereupon, subject to the provisions of Section 5 of this Chapter, it shall become effective. If he disapproves a proposed ordinance, he shall, within five (5) days of its receipt by him, return it to the clerk of the Town Council with a statement of the reasons for his disapproval, which statement shall be transmitted by said clerk to the Town Council at its next meeting.*

*If the Town Council shall pass the proposed ordinance by an affirmative vote of at least six (6) members within fourteen (14) days after such ordinance has been returned with the Mayor's disapproval, it shall become effective without his approval subject to said Section 5. If the Mayor does not return the proposed ordinance within the time required, it shall become effective without his approval subject to said Section 5.*

**RE: Disapproval of Ordinance #100-021**

Chairman St. VII,

I return to you the attached Ordinance #100-021 which is disapproved. Also attached are 2+ pages of comments from the Town Attorney, indicating issues with the document as well as 2 pages of comments from Parks and Rec Director Scott Johnson Jr. My concern is and continues to be a lack of a proper ordinance that reasonably addresses concerns raised in prior meetings, reduces liability exposure to the Town, does not adversely impact Parks and Rec programming for our residents and does not become a political weapon- as demonstrated in Montville and Waterford most recently. The Town Attorney has stated "he cannot defend this ordinance". Of grave concern is another attachment, which is Councilor Buhles reply email to me on Thursday, October 9th at 11:30AM. (You are provided both my email to her and her response to me). The one line response "I am working on it now and anticipate having it to you shortly" flies right in the face of governmental transparency as the Town Council voted on this ordinance the previous night (without the benefit of any Councilor having a copy of the ordinance they were voting on, other than Ms. Buhle). This email does not suggest, it says that she is working on an ordinance that was passed the night before. No ordinance should be edited in any way after approval- it should be exactly as was voted on the previous night. An ordinance that goes to Public Hearing is meant to be the final draft- It should not be amended post- Public Hearing. Lastly, I want to add further context to a memo you read at the October 8, 2025 meeting authored by Fred Allyn Jr, then Mayor. In said memo, it suggested the town create an ethics commission. What was omitted from the 10/8 meeting is that as part of the forensic audit- completed as a result of the embezzlement by a Town Employee, a decision was made to implement a Fraud Policy, require two sign-off's on checks of a certain dollar threshold, the

tax refund policy and the vehicle use policy. Since that time nearly two decades ago, the implemented policies continue to protect the Town and taxpayers.

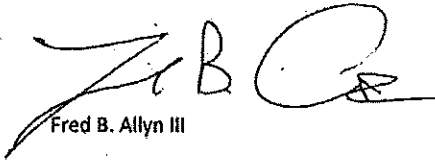
As I previously stated in my letter to the Town Council on 9/24/25:

- The Town Charter grants the Town Council the power to investigate.
- The Fraud Policy outlines no less than eight different situations that constitute fraud.
- The Employee Handbook covers Nepotism, Conflict of Interest, Outside Employment and the Vehicle Use Policy.

Lastly, *there is no budget for this new commission or its attorneys.* Please note, the Authority/Duty of the new commission, upon receipt of a complaint is "To consult with The Town Attorney or another attorney" and "To request that the Town Attorney provide advisory opinions". These consultations, investigations and advisory opinions cost money. The Town Attorney has suggested a minimum of \$20,000 for such a commission- though it can go markedly higher based on the allegations, if the result is appealed to Superior Court, etc. Also know, the Town is required to provide legal counsel to the accused. Our insurance carrier, CIRMA includes stated deductibles between \$1,000 and \$10,000 per occurrence.

In closing, please know I do fully support a proper "Code of Ethics" and updating to our Fraud Policy and Conflict of Interest statement, if warranted.

AN ORDINANCE  
ESTABLISHING A TOWN OF LEDYARD  
CODE OF ETHICS AND ETHICS COMMISSION

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Ledyard:

Section 1. Authority

In accordance with Chapter III of the Town Charter, there is hereby established a Town of Ledyard Code of Ethics and Ethics Commission.

Section 2. Declaration of Policy and Purpose

The trust of the public is essential for government to function effectively. The proper operation of the Town government requires that Town officials, and Town employees be independent, impartial, and responsible to the people; that governmental decisions and policies be made in the proper channels of governmental structure; that public office and employment not be used for personal gain; and that the public has confidence in the integrity of its government.

Therefore, herewith is an established Code of Ethics for all Town officials and Town employees. The purpose of this code is to establish standards of ethical conduct for all such officials and employees, and for those who serve or conduct business with the Town of Ledyard, to assist those parties under the jurisdiction of the Ethics Commission by establishing guidelines for their conduct in order to maintain a tradition of responsible and effective public service; and to establish rules of procedure to be followed by the Ethics Commission in receiving adjudicating, and reporting on alleged violations of the Code of Ethics.

Section 3. Applicability

The Code of Ethics shall apply to all Town officials, including members of the Board of Education, and all Town and Board of Education employees.

Section 4. Definitions

As used in this ordinance, the following words or phrases shall have the meanings indicated:

1. "Complainant" means any person who signs a complaint under penalties of false statement alleging a violation of this Code.
2. "Confidential Information" means information acquired by a Town official or Town employee in the course of and by reason of performing an individual's official duties and which is not a matter of public record or public knowledge.
3. "Financial Interest" means:
  - a. Any interest that has a monetary value of more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in any calendar year and is not common to the other citizens of the Town;
  - b. Pecuniary or material benefit accruing to a Town official or Town employee, or immediate family of an official or employee of the Town as a result of a contract, transaction, zoning decision or other matter which is, or may be, the subject of an official act or action by or with the Town of Ledyard except for such contracts of transactions which by their terms and by the substance of their provisions confer the opportunity and right to realize the accrual of similar benefits to all persons and/or property similarly situated;

- c. Shall be deemed to exist if any Town official, Town employee, immediate family of a Town official or employee might, directly or indirectly, derive financial gain or suffer loss from any purchase, contract, transaction, zoning decision, or other matter involving any such Town office, board, commission, authority or committee, and shall also be deemed to exist if a business or professional enterprise in which the Town official or employee has any financial interest as owner, member, partner, officer, employee or stockholder or has any other form of participation which will be affected by the outcome of the matter under consideration.
4. "Gift" means anything of economic value in excess of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), including but not limited to entertainment, food, beverage, travel, and lodging. A gift does not include:
- a. A political contribution that is otherwise reported in accordance with the law.
  - b. Services provided by persons volunteering their time.
  - c. A commercially reasonable loan that is made on terms not more favorable than loans made in the ordinary course of business.
  - d. A gift received from a member of a person's immediate family or fiancé.
  - e. Goods or services which are provided to the municipality and facilitate government actions or functions.
  - f. A certificate, plaque, or other ceremonial award.
  - g. A rebate or discount on the price of anything of value made in the ordinary course of business, without regard to that person's status.
  - h. Printed or recorded information germane to municipal action or functions. An honorary degree.
  - i. Costs associated with attending a conference or business meeting and/or the registration or entrance fee to attend such conference or business meeting in which the Town official or Town employee participates in his or her official capacity.
  - j. Any gift provided to a Town Official or Town Employee or to an immediate family member of a Town Official or Town Employee for the celebration of a major life event provided any such gift provided to an individual does not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) in value. A major life event shall include, but not be limited to, a ceremony commemorating an individual's induction into religious adulthood such as a confirmation or bar mitzvah; a wedding; a funeral; the birth or adoption of a child; and retirement from public service or Town employment.
5. "Immediate family" means spouse, fiancé, child, parent, grandchild, brother, sister, grandparent, niece, nephew, daughter-in-law, son-in-law, mother-in-law, father-in-law, sister-in-law, brother-in-law, or anyone living in the same household.
6. "Respondent" means any person accused of violating this Code.
7. "Town Official" means any person holding elective or appointive office in the government of the Town, including members of the Board of Education.
8. "Town Employee" means any person receiving a salary, wages, or stipend from the Town or the Board of Education for services rendered, whether full-time or part-time, including outsourced administrative or executive professionals, including but not limited to consultants and the Town Attorney.

#### Section 5. Conflict of Interest Provisions

1. A Town official, Town employee, or any member of his or her immediate family shall not engage in or participate in any business or transaction, nor have an interest, direct or indirect, which is incompatible with the proper discharge of that person or persons' independent judgement or action in the performance of that person or persons' official duties.

2. A Town official or any member of his or her immediate family shall not have a financial interest in any contract or purchase order for any supplies, materials, equipment or contractual services furnished to or used by the board, agency or commission of which that person is an elected or appointed member.
3. A Town employee or any member of his or her immediate family shall not have a financial interest in any contract or purchase order for any supplies, materials, equipment, or contractual services that is within the purview of such Town employee, unless the contract or purchase order is awarded through the traditional bid or quote process and conflict is disclosed.
4. The Mayor of the Town of Ledyard and members of the Town Council of the Town of Ledyard, members of the Board of Education of the Town of Ledyard, and any members of their immediate family shall not have a financial interest in any contract or purchase order for any supplies, materials, equipment, or contractual services furnished to or used by the Town of Ledyard. This provision does not apply to Town employees or Board of Education employees providing recreational including but not limited to classes, coaching, or camp counseling through Ledyard Parks and Recreation or Ledyard Board of Education.
5. A Town official or employee shall refrain from voting upon or otherwise participating in any matter on behalf of the municipality if he or she, a member of his or her immediate family, or a business with which the person is associated has a financial or personal interest in the transaction or contract, including but not limited to the sale of real state, material, supplies, or services to the municipality. If such participation is within the scope of the Town official's or Town employee's responsibility, he or she shall be required to provide written disclosure, that sets forth in detail the nature and extent of such interest.
6. A Town official or Town employee shall not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, from any person or business to which any contract or purchase order may be awarded by the Town of Ledyard or any of its boards, agencies, or commissions any money, rebate, or gifts, or any promise, obligation, or contract for future reward or compensation.
7. No Town officials or employees shall accept a gift or engage in private employment or render services when the gift, employment, or services are incompatible with the proper discharge of the official duties of the Town official or Town employee, or could tend to impair independence of judgement or action by the Town official or Town employee, in the performance of his or her official duties. If a prohibited gift is offered to a Town official or a Town employee, he or she shall refuse it, return it, or pay the donor the market value of the gift.
8. To avoid even the appearance of impropriety or creation of a situation that would be contrary to the declared policy and purpose of this Code, a Town official or a Town employee, not otherwise restrained by the Code, shall exercise care when appearing before other Agencies and shall disclose whether he or she is appearing in his or her official capacity or as a private citizen.
9. A Town official or employee who have a financial or personal interest in any transactions or contract with the Town, including but not limited to the sale of real estate, materials, supplies, or services to the Town, on which that person or persons may be called upon to act in that persons official capacity shall not vote or otherwise participate in the transaction on behalf of the Town. The Town official or employee shall declare on the record that he or she has or have a conflict of interest.
10. No Town official or Town employee shall solicit or accept a gift from any person or business entity which is interested directly or indirectly in any business transaction or pending matter that is within the purview of such Town official or Town employee.
11. Town officials and Town employees shall not use Town owned vehicles, equipment, facilities, materials, or property for personal convenience or profit.
12. No Town official or Town employee shall disclose or use confidential information acquired in the course of and by reason of his or her official duties for personal or financial gain or for the personal or financial gain of a member of his or her immediate family.

13. No Town official or Town employee may directly hire or supervise a member of his or her immediate family or participate in influencing the appointment or hiring of his or her immediate family.
14. No former Town official shall represent anyone before any Town agency, board, commission, council, or committee in which he or she was formerly an elected or appointed member for a period of one (1) year following the end of such former member's service on such agency, board, commission, council, or committee.
15. No former Town employee shall represent anyone before any Town agency or department for which he or she was formerly employed for a period of one (1) year following the end of such former employee's employment with the Town.

Section 6. Disclosure of Interests Required

1. Any Town official or Town employee who has a private financial interest in any action, legislative or otherwise, by any Town agency and who is a member of, participates in discussion with or give an official opinion to such Town agency shall disclose on the written records of such agency the true nature and extent of such interest. This section shall not apply to:
  - a. Contracts awarded to the lowest responsible bidder after public advertisement.
  - b. Unpaid appointed officials during a declared state of emergency.
  - c. Matters requiring disclosure to or approval by a court.
  - d. The Town Attorney, Town Engineer, or similar Official, who is participating in or offering an opinion on behalf of said agency, and whose financial interest is merely in being paid for such services.
2. All Town Councilors, Board of Education members, and the Mayor shall, on or before January 1<sup>st</sup> each year, file with the Town Clerk, on a form to be prepared by the Town Attorney, a statement, under oath, containing the following information:
  - a. All real estate located within the Town of Ledyard owned by such elected official or held under a lease for a term exceeding five years, excluding, however, his or her principal residence. The foregoing shall also apply to real estate owned or leased, as aforesaid, by a corporation, trust or partnership in which any such elected official is the legal or equitable holder of at least 5% of the legal or equitable interest in said corporation, trust, or partnership.
  - b. The names of any firm, proprietorship, partnership, or corporation of which said elected official is an employee or in which such elected official holds at least a five (5) percent interest, and which firm, proprietorship, partnership, corporation, or limited liability corporation has sold or supplied goods or services in excess of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per annum to the Town of Ledyard during the two years immediately preceding such official's election to office.
  - c. Any income, fees, salary, or wages directly or indirectly, received by such official from the Town of Ledyard or its political subdivisions during the two years immediate proceeding such official's election to public office.

Section 7. Establishment of an Ethics Commission

1. Membership

The Ethics Commission shall be comprised of five (5) regular members and two (2) alternate members. All members of the Ethics Commission shall be electors of the Town.

- a. No more than two (2) Regular Members may be affiliated with any one political party. Both Alternate Members may not be affiliated with the same political party. At least one Regular Member shall be registered as an unaffiliated.

- b. No regular member or alternate member of the Ethics Commission shall:
- i. Be a Town official or Town employee of the Town of Ledyard or be a member of the immediate family of any Town official;
  - ii. Have held any elected Town or State office for a period of one (1) year prior to being appointed to the Ethics Commission.
  - iii. Be a member of a Town committee or commission.
  - iv. Serve as a member of another Town agency, board, commission, council, or committee.
  - v. Have been employed by the Town for a period of one (1) year prior to being appointed to the Ethics Commission.
  - vi. Have any financial interest in matters before the Town or the Board of Education unless disclosed to the Ethics Commission.
  - vii. Have been found in violation of any federal, state, municipal, or professional Code of Ethics.

## 2. Terms of Appointment

- a. Members shall be appointed by the Town Council for a term of three (3) years and shall serve until their successor has qualified or is removed by the Town Council.
- b. In making the original appointments under this ordinance, the Town Council shall designate two (2) regular members to serve for three (3) years; two (2) regular members to serve for two (2) years; one (1) regular member to serve for (1) year; one (1) alternate member to serve for three (3) years; and one (1) alternate member to serve for two (2) years. Thereafter, vacancies shall be filled for a three (3) year term.
- c. Inaugural members shall be eligible to serve two (2) additional three (3) year term beyond his or her initial appointment.
- d. Any vacancy on the Ethics Commission, other than by expiration of term, shall be filled for the unexpired portion of the term by the Town Council.
- e. The Town Council may remove members for cause and fill the vacancy in accordance with the Town Charter. Cause for removal shall include, but is not limited to, an unexcused absence from three (3) consecutive meetings. It shall be the responsibility of the Chairman of the Ethics Commission to notify the Town Council when a member has not properly performed his or her duties.
- f. Within thirty (30) days of the appointment of the Ethics Commission, an organizational meeting shall be held at which members shall choose a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary.

## 3. Authority/Duties

The Town of Ledyard Ethics Commission shall be authorized to perform the following:

- a. To consult with the Town Attorney or another attorney hired by the Ethics Commission if so authorized by the Town Council.
- b. To request that the Town Attorney provide advisory opinions.

## 4. Filing of Complaints

A complaint alleging any violation of the Code of Ethics shall be made on a form prescribed by the Ethics Commission and signed under penalty of false statement. The form shall be delivered to the Town Clerk who shall transmit a copy of the complaint to the Chairperson of the Ethics Commission and the respondent within five (5) days of receipt of the complaint. The Ethics Commission shall also notify the respondent that it will conduct a probable cause determination and invite the respondent to provide any information the respondent deems relevant to the Ethics Commission's determination of probable cause.

No complaint may be made under the Code of Ethics unless it is filed with the Ethics Commission within three (3) years after the violation alleged in the complaint has been committed.

The Complaint shall include:

- a. Name of the person accused (respondent)
- b. Name of the person filing the complaint.
- c. The specific acts alleged to constitute a violation of the Code of Ethics and when said actions occurred.

In the application of this Code of Ethics, care will be given to distinguish between concerns of management of Town employees and violations of the public trust. The daily management of employee performance is the responsibility of the Mayor or School Superintendent in the case of the employees of Ledyard Public Schools. Personnel policies should be the first guide in those areas where applicable. Similarly, the routine activities of the Commission should be governed by its rules and regulations.

#### 5. Evaluation and Acknowledgement

- a. Within sixty (60) business days of the receipt of a complaint, the Ethics Commission shall review and determine whether there is probable cause that a violation of the Code of Ethics has occurred. A finding of probable cause means that based on a review of the available information the Ethics Commission determines that reasonable grounds exist to believe that the respondent engaged in prohibited conduct by the Code of Ethics. If the Ethics Commission does not make a finding of probable cause, the complaint shall be dismissed and a copy of its decision shall be mailed to both the complainant and the respondent. Unless the Ethics Commission makes a finding of probable cause, a complaint alleging a violation of this Code of Ethics shall be confidential except upon the request of the respondent.
- b. If the Ethics Commission makes a finding of probable cause which shall require four (4) affirmative votes, it shall so advise both the complainant and the respondent within ten (10) business days of its finding and begin a formal investigation process.

#### 6. Hearings

If the Ethics Commission decides that probable cause of a violation of the Code of Ethics exists, it will conduct a public hearing to determine whether or not a violation occurred in accordance with Uniform Administrative Procedure Act ("UAPA") (See Chapter 54 of the Connecticut General Statutes). At the hearing, the respondent will have the right to be represented by legal counsel, to present evidence and witnesses, and compel attendance of witnesses and the production of books, documents, records, and papers, and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, and inspect and copy relevant and material records, papers, and documents not in such person's possession. Hearings are not governed by the legal rules of evidence, and any information relevant to the matter may be considered. The Ethics Commission will respect the rules of privilege recognized by the law. Not later than ten (10) days before the start of the hearing, the Ethics Commission will provide the respondent with a list of its intended witnesses. The Ethics Commission will make a record of the proceedings.

#### 7. Final Decisions

- a. Decisions by the Ethics Commission that a person is in violation of the Code of Ethics must result from the concurring vote of four (4) of its members.
- b. The Ethics Commission must render its decision within sixty (60) days of the closing of the hearing.

- c. Such finding and memorandum will be deemed to be final decision of the commission for the purposes of the UAPA. The respondent may appeal to the superior court in accordance with the provision of Section 4-183 of the Connecticut General Statutes.
- d. If the Ethics Commission determines that the Code of Ethics was violated, it will provide the respondent, the Mayor, and the Ledyard Town Council with a copy of its findings and memorandum within ten (10) days after its decision. It will also advise the respondent of his or her right to appeal the decision pursuant to Section 4-183 of the Connecticut General Statutes.

8. Penalties for Violations of the Code of Ethics

A violation of the Code of Ethics may lead to any one or a combination of the following penalties:

- a. Order to cease and desist the violation;
- b. Pay a civil penalty of up to the maximum amount permitted by State law;
- c. Censure;
- d. Suspension without pay;
- e. Demotion;
- f. Termination of employment;
- g. Restitution of any pecuniary benefits received because of the violation committed;

Section 8. Severability

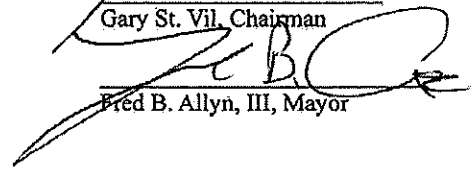

I see a Facebook page as a means of really hearing from the community. As you know Ledyard Life has appeared on Facebook and residents are going to this unofficial site to give their opinions.

We need an official Facebook page that is sanctioned and run by the Town Council.

I realize that comments on this site would not be put into the official record, but we could have a disclaimer and send residents with their concerns or suggestions directly to [towncouncil@ledyardct.org](mailto:towncouncil@ledyardct.org).

Looking at the Ledyard website, it is difficult to find our email address. You have to go through three pages to get there. I think that many residents may not even know how to contact the Council.

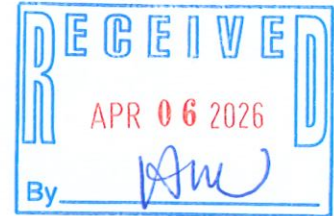

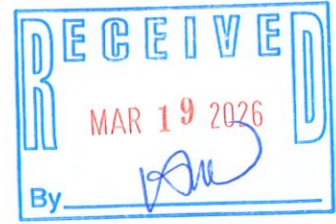

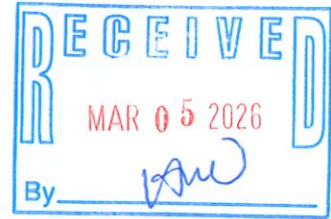
