

Gales Ferry National Historic District #1

Visual Inventory

Gales Ferry Historic District west of the railroad cut is architecturally significant as a well-preserved collection of historic buildings, dating from c. 1750 to 1930, which illustrate the development of the village as a small river trading port and its associations with the 19th century whaling and sealing trade from about 1750 to 1880. The district is distinguished by several exceptional examples of architectural styles, including the Federal, Greek Revival, and Italianate, which are individually significant and display a high level of craftsmanship. ¹

It derives further significance from its later long continuous association with the Yale-Harvard Regatta held annually on the Thames River after 1878. Many noteworthy houses contribute to the historical integrity of the district as representative examples of vernacular architecture from the late 18th century to the early 20th century. A few are fine examples of the work of local carpenter/joiners and all have consistency of scale, form, and materials.
